Pentecost Dreams

When it comes to church holidays, Christmas and Easter get all the attention, but what about Pentecost? This year, Pentecost Sunday falls on May 19. But many of us may be hard pressed to put in plain words the real impact of the day.

Pentecost is the day considered to be the birth of the church. On that day, the Holy Spirit came to fill and inspire believers. Jesus had ascended, but he sent the Spirit so His followers could continue with the comfort, guidance, and the empowering presence of God. Each year, Pentecost comes 50 days after Easter Sunday and gets its' meaning from the Greek word for 50 which is Pentecost. The beginning of Pentecost is recorded in Acts 2:1-2.

It was also a Jewish festival, the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot, the commemoration God giving the Torah to the nation of Israel at Mt Sinai. The disciples of Jesus had gathered together for this festival when:

"Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them."

Pentecost brings the 50-day Easter season to a close but more importantly, it points the church forward toward new beginnings, for it's when we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit and the new horizons that are opening up in the story of God's commitment to the world.

Pentecost Sunday isn't just about celebrating the past. It is a powerful invitation to dream, to dare, to commit. Because when a faith community stops dreaming dreams, what does it have to offer itself or the world around it?

When the Holy Spirit descended some 2,000 years ago, Peter, explained the event to a mystified crowd by reminding them of the Prophet Joel's words: *"In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy."*

Words such as "prophecy" and "visions" might scare some of us.



Hymn of the Month

#209 "We Walk by Faith, and Not By Sight"

Words: Henry Alford (1810-1871)

Hymn Tune: *St. Botolph*, Gordon Slater
(1896-1979)

The composer of the words for this hymn was Henry Alford (1810-1871) who was educated at Trinity College, Cambridge, England and graduated with honors in 1832. One year later, he began his career that involved several parishes and institutions and culminated with the Deanery of Canterbury which he held to his death. During his career, he also held many literary positions and developed his edition of the Greek testament which took 20 years to complete. Alford also performed extensive work with hymnology and poetry not only composing hymns of his own but also translating them from other languages. One of his compositions is a hymn that we associate most often with the Thanksgiving holiday in this country "Come, Ye Thankful People, Come".

If you look at the bottom left of each hymn in the hymnal, you will notice that each has a tune name listed in *italics*. The reason for this is that often a tune may be used with one or more other hymns. For example, the tune name for Hymn #209 that we are learning during the month of May is also the tune that is used with #603 in our hymnal.

This is by no means unusual; you may notice that we use the same tune for "All Creatures of Our God and King" that we use for "Ye Watchers and Ye Holy Ones".

The tune that is assigned to #209 in our hymnal is "St. Botolph" and was composed by Gordon Slater (1896-1979). Interestingly, this tune was first published in England in a collection entitled "Songs of Praise for Boys and Girls" and so it was very possibly originally used as a Sunday school hymn. The tune was named for St. Botolph's Parish Church in Boston, Lincolnshire, England, where Slater served as organist for a time. The church honors St. Botolph, the seventh-century abbot of an influential monastery thought to have been northeast of Ipswich in Suffolk, England. This monastery was destroyed during the Danish invasions of that time. Slater also served a time as organist and choirmaster at Lincoln Cathedral where he supervised the rebuilding of the cathedral's organ in 1960. During those years he was also the conductor of the Lincoln Symphony Orchestra. He taught at various British Colleges and universities, was a well-known organ recitalist for the BBC, and composed anthems and hymn tunes. In British churches, the hymn "Jesus, the Very Thought of You" is often sung to St. Botolph.

Trinity Sunday

Trinity Sunday is celebrated in all the Western liturgical churches: Roman Catholic, Anglican, Lutheran, (most) Presbyterians, Methodists, and many churches within the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship.

The Sundays following Pentecost, until Advent, are numbered from this day. In traditional Catholic usage, the *First Sunday After Pentecost* is on the same day as Trinity Sunday. In the Church of England, following the pre-Reformation Sarum use, the following Sunday is the "First Sunday after Trinity", while the Episcopal Church in the United States of America (ECUSA) now follows the Catholic usage, calling it the Second Sunday after Pentecost. The liturgical color used on Trinity Sunday is white.

In the traditional Divine Office, the Athanasian Creed (*Quicumque vult*) is said on this day at Prime (first hour of daylight.) Before 1960, it was said on all Sundays after Epiphany and Pentecost which do not fall within Octaves (eighth day after a feast) or on which a feast of Double rank or higher was celebrated or commemorated, as well as on Trinity Sunday. The 1960 reforms reduced it to once a year, on this Sunday.

The Creed of Saint Athanasius, although not often used, is recited in certain Anglican churches, particularly those of High Church tendency. It may be found in the Historical Documents section of the 1979 Book of Common Prayer, but its use is not specifically provided for in the rubrics of that prayer book.

Trinity Sunday has the status of a Principal Feast in the Church of England and is one of seven principal feast days in the Episcopal Church

Thomas Becket (1118–70) was consecrated Archbishop of Canterbury on the Sunday after Whit Sunday, and his first act was to ordain that the day of his consecration should be held as a new festival in honor of the Holy Trinity. This observance spread from Canterbury throughout the whole of Christendom.


