Luke 17:11-19 (Gospel reading from the lectionary for Thanksgiving Day, 2017)

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered a village, ten lepers approached him. Keeping their distance, they called out, saying, 'Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!' When he saw them, he said to them, 'Go and show yourselves to the priests.' And as they went, they were made clean. Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. He prostrated himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. Then Jesus asked, 'Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? Was none of them found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?' Then he said to him, 'Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well.'

Consider this event in the life of Jesus. He was walking with his disciples along the border between Samaria and Galilee. They were entering a village when they came upon a band of ten lepers, both Jews and Samaritans. It's amazing, how misery can cut across social, religious and racial lines?

Jesus' whole reason for being was to reach out to marginalized and suffering, no matter who they were. So, when he encountered these lepers, he sought to minister to them. However, he took a most unusual approach. Instead of laying hands on them or speaking a word of healing to them, he said to them, "Go show yourselves to the priests."

The Old Testament required the cured leper to have his cure confirmed by a temple priest. But these men hadn't yet been healed. Jesus was requiring an act of faith out of them. They were to begin their pilgrimage to show themselves at the temple even before their healing was complete. That is faith.

They must have been filled with joy, and yet only one of them went back to Jesus to say, "Thank you." It was a Samaritan who returned to give thanks.

Saying Thank you is a statement of our character, no matter who we are. Everyone may feel gratitude but to go to the trouble of expressing that gratitude is a sign of character. It says something about the kind of people we are.

Saying Thank you is also an acknowledgement of God's grace. I think the greatest barrier to saying Thank you for many of us is our pride. We don't like acknowledging our dependence on anybody, even God. We think of ourselves, especially in our society as self-made individuals. We like to believe that we have no one to thank but ourselves. Perhaps 9 out of 10 lepers would agree?

Saying Thank you is also a statement of worship. That is why we celebrate Thanksgiving. It is our offering to the Source of our being. It is our humble way of saying, Thanks for all with which we have been gifted. It isn't optional for us as people of God. It is what being a follower of Christ is about. It is part of our connectedness to and gratitude for all of God's creation, even if we are only 1 in 10.

I hope we will take time, not only on Thanksgiving Day, but every day to stand before God and simply say, Thank you.



Weather Cancellations

In the last few years extremely poor weather has forced us to cancel services five times: December 29 in 2013, January 5 & 26 in 2014, and February 18 (Ash Wednesday) in 2015, and January 16 in 2016.

Services are not cancelled without a lot of thought. The supply priest, Tom, any available members of the Vestry, and the senior warden decide what is the best and safest choice. After making the decision, the next problem is to let everyone know.



We will try to make the decision to cancel late Saturday afternoon/

evening rather than Sunday morning because it is very important to be sure that everyone is contacted. But weather is extremely changeable, and it may be necessary to cancel on Sunday morning.

These are the steps that will be followed:

<u>1. Pay attention to the weather.</u> If the weather forecast is predicting "no travel advised" or any kind of extreme weather for Saturday night and/or Sunday morning/afternoon, please check your email on Saturday evening and again on Sunday morning.

2. An email will be sent out on Saturday afternoon/evening stating there is a possibility that there will not be church and asking you to check your email before leaving for church.

3. An email will be sent out announcing cancellation of church. This will be done late Saturday night or early Sunday morning (before 7:00 am).

Only people who do not have an email address will be called and a message left on their answering machine if no one answers. Other people will not be called. If you specifically want to be called, please let Tim know by early December. If you know of anyone who does not have or may not check their email, please call them and let them know.

If possible local radio or TV stations will be asked to put a notice on the air and on their websites. We will call as many local stations as possible; but some stations do not staff their offices on Sunday morning.

The National Weather Service is predicting a winter with below-average temperatures and wetter-than-average conditions across most of the northern US. Hopefully the forecasters are wrong, and we have a relatively mild winter so that no services have to be cancelled. But it is always good to have a plan.
